History of Newspapers

- **Earliest newspaper**
 - Started in 1605
 - *Relation aller Fürnemmen und gedenckwürdigen Historien*
 - “*Distinguished and Commemorable News*”
 - German language
 - Published in Strasburg
 - Coverage: Holy Roman Empire of the German Nation

History of Newspapers

- **Longest running newspaper**
 - Started in 1645
 - *Ordinari Post Tijdender*
 - “Regular Mail Times”
 - *Swedish Language*
 - *Published in Stockholm, Sweden*

History of Newspapers

- **Earliest American newspaper**
 - Started in 1704
 - *The Boston News-Letter*
 - English language
 - Published in Boston, Massachusetts
 - Coverage: Thirteen Colonies

- **Longest running American newspaper**
 - Started in 1756
 - *The New Hampshire Gazette*
 - English language
 - Published in New Hampshire
 - Coverage: Thirteen Colonies

Reading the Newspaper

- Pre-digital typesetting
 - We have to read the originals or copies (usually on microfilm) with our eyes, or
 - We have to read OCR transcriptions
- With digital typesetting
 - We can read the digital versions
- What is OCR? (Optical Character Recognition)
 - Computer software that attempts to read and transcribe the text

How does OCR work?

- Two distinct methods
 - Matrix matching: each character is compared to a database of known patterns or shapes and assigned the correct character code
 - The fastest method (24 words per min.)
 - Feature extraction: each character is analyzed for general features, such as open areas, closed shapes, diagonal lines, line intersections, etc
 - Used for specialty fonts or handwriting

Searching Newspapers

- Newspapers are scanned page by page and transcribed using OCR technology
- The transcriptions are loaded into an “everyword index” (almost every word)
- The index is searchable by a “search engine”
- The quality and clarity of the image is critical



The shear volume of newsprint is enormous!

- Not all newspapers have survived
- We do not know where some are located
- Many newspapers reserve their archives for generating revenue
- The expense of maintaining repositories is too much

From the general good conduct of the population, and from the activity of the police, he was glad to remark that every offender had been easily detected, and, therefore, no difficulty was experienced in bringing the accused to trial. He reminded the Grand Jury of the importance of a punctual attendance at the opening of the Sessions in future: for unless *thirteen* gentlemen assembled, the business could not proceed; and after a few brief observations on the importance of manifesting a sympathy with, and a desire to ameliorate, the condition of the lower orders at the present inclement season of the year, he dismissed them to their duties.

The Counsel present, were Mr. O'Malley and Mr. Dasent.

WATCH STEALING, AT STOKES.—*Jeremiah Giles*, 20, pleaded guilty to a charge of having stolen a silver watch, with its appendages, the property of Mr. Emanuel **Tranter**, of Stoke. The prosecutor recommended the prisoner to mercy. His parents were industrious and honest people, and he (Mr. **Giles**) was convinced that the prisoner had been driven to commit the crime, from want. Giles was a seafaring man, and had been out of work for some time.—One month's imprisonment.

WATCH STEALING, AT ST. CLEMENT'S.—*Charles Orms*, only twelve years of age, and an orphan, who, it was stated, had recently come from Stowmarket, pleaded guilty to a charge of having, on the 25th day of November last, stolen one silver watch, the property of Henry Jenkin. The prisoner said he had no one to call to give testimony in favor of his previous character; and the police stated that they knew nothing ill against him, except the present charge. In consequence of his extreme youth, and of his not having the advice and protection of parents, the prisoner was sentenced to one month's imprisonment.

LARCENY.—*Charlotte Newson*, (a miserable looking woman) the wife of Richard Newson, of the parish of St. Mary Key, aged 29, was charged with having, on the 25th day of November last, stolen a woman's cloak, of the value of five shillings, the property of Grace Howard.—*Mira Rahdall* deposed, that she was at the house of the prosecutor about 4 o'clock on Saturday afternoon, the 26th of November; she saw a cloak hanging upon a horse, near the door; the prisoner came in about half-past four.—*Joseph Walter Sayer*, pawnbroker, Ipswich, said, the prisoner came to his shop on the evening of the day in question; she offered a cloak to pledge, and he lent her one shilling and nine-

pence.

1835, constituted the Incorporation of the Cosford Hundred.

That throughout the spring of 1835, the evils arising out of the old system of relief had grown up to an alarming height. The incorporated workhouse was then tenanted by many able-bodied paupers, who refused to do any kind of work, and defied, by turbulent insubordination, both the rules of the house and the power of the Magistrates. They broke all the windows within reach of their missiles; destroyed window-frames, doors, and door-frames; kept open apertures in the partition and outer walls of the workhouse; beat the governor, &c.

From the disposition thus manifested by the paupers within the house, and shared by those without, it was quite evident there was a design to demolish the workhouse, in order that the unfeeling parochial relief might entirely cease to be measured by the necessity of the poor, but he yielded to lawless intimidation.

That in this state of things the acting Directors and Guardians, as well as the Magistrates of the Hundred, appealed earnestly to the Poor-law Commissioners for advice and assistance.

The Directors and Guardians, in utter hopelessness of being able, by any application of the powers granted them by the Acts of Incorporation to re-establish order, and to guard against the danger which seemed to menace the security of persons and property, in conjunction with the ratepayers of the Hundred qualified to serve as Guardians, petitioned the Poor-law Commissioners to dissolve the Incorporation, and to extend to them the unrestricted benefits of their power and co-operation.

That, in compliance with such application, the Poor-law Commissioners dissolved the Incorporation, and formed the Cosford Union, with an addition of ten parishes, the population of the new union being more than double that of the disincorporated Hundred.

That barely fifteen months have transpired since the new measures came into operation, yet the success which has attended them has in every respect been such as to excite the surprise and admiration of all who have had an opportunity of appreciating the change.

The management of the workhouse is now conducted with regularity and decorum. Profligacy and idleness and insolence among the poor have been replaced by sobriety, industry, and civility. Not only the paupers themselves, but the labourers above that class, and persons still further removed from want, have become in a marked degree more frugal and prudent. Under the workhouse system permanent employment has become general where it was before

SHEEP STEALING AT DEDHAM.

Isaac Lott, 21, was charged with having, on the 28th of February last, stolen a sheep, the property of Mr. Abram Constable, of Dedham. Mr. O'Malley appeared for the prosecution. William Banes, farming bailiff, said his master, Mr. Constable, had a farm at Braantham, but the sheep were feeding in a field belonging to Mr. *Cooper*, in that parish. He counted 75 sheep at 4 o'clock on the afternoon of the 27th of February, and on the morning of the 28th, he missed one. He found blood in a ditch in the field where the sheep had its throat cut, and he also found the footsteps of a man, which he traced to a dunghill in the adjoining field, where he found the skin and the head of the sheep. He further traced the footsteps to the entrance of Catawade street, and found blood on three gates, where a person had rested, on his road from the field. Witness saw the prisoner in the course of the morning, in a meadow belonging to Mr. *Cooper*. The prisoner then passed over a gate, and witness having come up, asked him to shew the soles of his shoes, when he found them to correspond with the footsteps in the meadow, as well as in the field from whence the sheep was stolen.—In support of this testimony, Papsifer, the constable of Braantham, produced impressions of the prisoner's shoes upon the soil, taken from the spot where the sheep was killed; (at the suggestion of Mr. Johnson, the Governor of Ipswich Gaol); as well as the shoes taken off the feet of the prisoner.—Mr. *Cooper* of Braantham, gave testimony in corroboration.—When the Chairman informed the prisoner, who appeared to be a hardened fellow, that he was at liberty to ask the witnesses any questions, he replied, in an off-hand manner, "No, Sir, I cannot ask any questions, because I don't know nothing about it." (A laugh.) The prisoner, in his defence, however, called John Thompson, who said on the 27th of February, about ten minutes before twelve at night, as he was going to bed, the prisoner, and another person, came over Braantham Bridge, to the door of witness' house. In the course of an hour afterwards, the prisoner went to sleep with John Allison. Cross-examined: James Howlett was the man who came with the prisoner to his door.—John Allison, the next witness, deposed that he slept with the prisoner on the night of the 27th February, in Martin's hay loft, which was about a mile and a half from *Cooper's* field, where the sheep was killed! The Jury found the prisoner guilty. The Chairman: Lott, you have been convicted of sheep stealing, and it appears to me that you have aggravated your case, by the witnesses you have called in your defence. Thompson and Allison, and I say it in their hearing—are two of the most notorious rascals in all Suffolk. Thompson is the son of a still greater rascal than himself, who has been repeatedly convicted of all manner of offences, and who keeps a most infamous house, where you, Allison and other parties, very well known to the administrators of justice, do all manner of wickedness. It is the determination

Charles Orms, 17, convicted of having stolen a tame rabbit, the property of John Hick Symonds: the prisoner having been convicted twice before of felony, was sentenced to be transported for seven years.

James Ringe, 29, was acquitted on a charge of having stolen a bag of pollard, from off the waggon of Jas. Ormsd, travelling on the Turnpike Road at Earl Stotham. No true bill against *Robert Ringe*, 17, charged with the same offence.

John Williams Clover, 42, convicted of having stolen from a mill, the property of John Tield, of Sotherrham, a quantity of meal: one month's imprisonment and hard labour.

John Watson, 29, convicted of having stolen from a shed 3 bushels of turnips, the property of the executors of the late Philip Ashford, of Badingham: 2 months' imprisonment and hard labour.

Charles Smith, 14, convicted of having stolen a pair of boots, at Claydon, the property of Edward Kersey: two months' imprisonment and hard labour.

Robert Haddock, 21, convicted of having stolen a spade from the workshop of John Adams, of Thorndon: three months' imprisonment and hard labour.

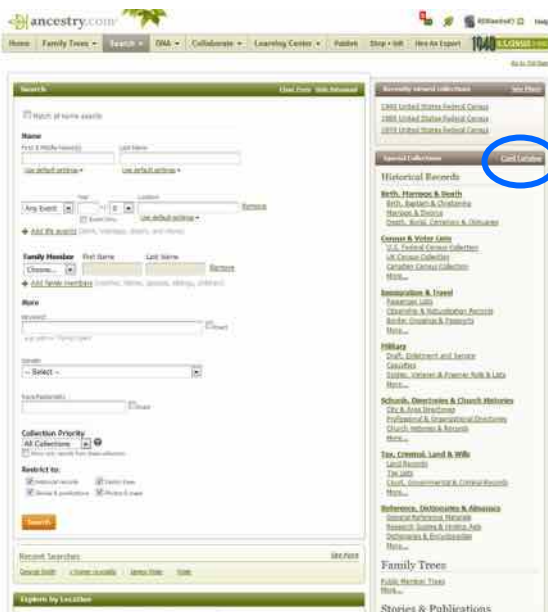
George Barnard, 40, convicted of having broken into the dwelling-house of Elizabeth Symonds, at Stowmarket: to be transported for ten years.
