Important dates during World War I

1914	
28 June	Archduke Francis Ferdinand of Austria assassinated in Sarajevo
28 July	Austria-Hungary declares war on Serbia (a Russian ally)
4 August	Germany invaded Belgium and begins the fighting
10 August	Austria-Hungary invaded Russia, opening Eastern front fighting

1915-1917

18 Feb 1915	Germany blockades the United Kingdom
7 May 1915	A German submarine sank the liner Lusitania

February 1917 Zimmerman telegram intercepted (German Ambassador Zimmerman asking Mexico to attack the U.S. in exchange for restoring land it lost in the Spanish American War)

6 April 1917 United States declared war on Germany

Isolationist policy 1914-1917 but

 U-boat activity off the North American coast

April 6, 1917 - U.S. declares war on Germany



Late June 1917 - First U.S. troops sent to Europe

Americans tipped the balance to the Allies

Consequences of the War

9 million soldiers died (some estimate nearly as many civilians)

21 million wounded

In the Ottoman Empire in 1915, 1.5 million Armenians were systematically killed

Worldwide Spanish Influenza killed many millions more

Economic Consequences

A cost of \$337 billion (\$1(1918)=\$16 (2017); accumulation of

War bonds leads to the Depression


Age range of typical soldier, 17-40


Average birth year 1873-1900


United States Census 1930



Selective Service

American Forces 1914-1918 May 18, 1917: Selective Service Act was passed

1914: U.S. Army consists of 127,588 active

1914: National Guardsmen:

181,620 active

At the end of 1917 the Army had

¹/₂ million draftees and 233,000 volunteers.


1917-1918: 24 million men born between 1873 and 1900 filled Draft registration cards


Three Draft Registrations


- 5 June 1917: all men between ages 21 and 31
- 5 June 1918: men who had reached 21 after 5 June 1917; supplemental registration 24 August 1918 for those reaching 21 after 5 June 1918
- 12 September 1918: men ages 18 through 45



U.S. citizens volunteered to serve in British and French forces

- The *Lafayette Escadrille*, a squadron in France's Aviation Militaire
- The Foreign Legion
- The American Ambulance Field Service was
 - organized in 1914
 - Served on the western front in France, Belgium and in Serbia later in the war
- The American Red Cross sent nurses to France along the Allied lines on the western front

Some Americans served thru Canada



American Legion in the Canadian Expeditionary Force (CEF)

Recruited Americans,

more than twenty percent deserted in training Deployed as the 97th Overseas Battalion of the CEF in September 1916

After arriving in England the Legion was divided into other regiments, causing many resignations, volunteers had been led to believe they would be allowed to fight as local units
